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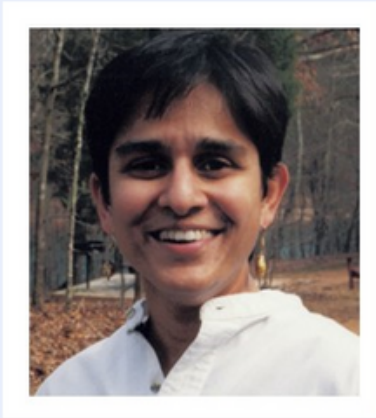

JOB SUMMARY

This position reports to Housing Support Service Manager, is a member of the Basic Center Program/Youth Shelter Team. The Youth Specialist is responsible for assisting with day to day operations of the shelter. Position requires the direct care of youth, providing crisis intervention and field response services to youth, families and agencies calling YCOP's 24-hour crisis line during assigned shift. Youth Specialists will provide life skill services and transportation of sheltered youth; provides awake supervision during overnight shifts of the facility, grounds, and residents. Position is required to carry out the care philosophies and approaches as they pertain to day to day operations of shelter care.

OVERVIEW

- Provide assistance with shelter maintenance including all health and safety requirements, both inside and outside
- Complete all required documentation and provide timely communication to Manager and/or Director as required.
- Comply with all California laws and Community Care Licensing standards and reporting responsibilities.-Assist with shelter entry during intake process, ensuring site is open and prepared for youth entry.

- Conduct and participate in intake interviews to determine program eligibility
 - Provide direct supervision of residents and direct assistance as necessary in activities of daily living (hygiene, shelter cleanliness, nourishment, social, educational, recreational and transportation).
 - Lead and supervise in the meal planning to include making of meals for and with program participants.
 - Assist with developing an initial service delivery plan, monitor youth's response to interventions and update or modify plans as indicated by youth's response.
 - Maintain updated case notes and maintain resident records in compliance with licensing standards within the designated agency system.
 - Complete work activity reporting, monitor for licensing requirements and maintain communication log.
 - Insure for discharging of residents, per case plan.
 - Provide telephone crisis intervention response to youth and families.
 - Assess youth and family needs during crisis and determine need for temporary emergency shelter, provide emergency field response as needed.
 - Conduct youth and family mediation.
 - Conduct community outreach and engagement activities at community events.
 - Complete all required training, attend weekly staff meetings and participate in in-service trainings.
 - Attend weekly case reviews with program manager.
 - Attend community meetings and collaboratives as needed
 - Attend all staff and agency meetings.
 - Adhere to state laws and Interface's procedures in regard to mandated reporting and confidentiality.
 - Engage with youth and partners in a culturally sensitivity, attuned, and responsiveness manner.
 - Other duties assigned or necessary

QUALIFICATIONS

- Minimum qualifications include two years or more experience working with youth and families in a crisis intervention capacity or in a residential facility, B.A. in psychology, sociology, criminal justice or related field and/or equivalent experience working with youth and families in a crisis intervention capacity or in a residential facility.
- Fluent bilingual English/Spanish oral communication skills; interact effectively with and collaboratively with youth, mental health professionals, social workers and law enforcement.
- Ability to work night shift/weekend shifts as needed. Computer literacy with MSWord, Excel, PowerPoint and the Internet.
- Must have means and capacity to perform job related duties with personal vehicle, as may be required, and must have proof of current automobile insurance, possess valid C.D.L. with agency carrier acceptable driving record.
- Successful background and criminal clearance required. Comply with all Community Care Licensing standards which included:
 - Proof of current (within 1 year) negative TB test, or willingness to obtain one.
 - Ability to obtain a physical to perform work duties.
 - Valid First Aid and CPR certification or willingness/ability to be certified.
 - Obtain fingerprints for criminal record clearance including child abuse index with acceptable results.
 - Maintain successful background and criminal clearance required. Bilingual incentive is included in hourly rate.

DACA Updates

On November 12, 2019, the U.S. Supreme Court heard arguments on whether the Trump administration's termination of Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) was legal. Led by the California case known as Department of Homeland Security vs. Regents of the University of California After November 12, while there is no exact date for the Supreme Court decision, legal experts expect the decision to come in spring 2020, and no later than the end of June

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR OUR UNDOCUMENTED STUDENTS?

- We highly encouraged students to renew their DACA ASAP if it expires anytime in 2020.
 - You can renew your DACA if you had it in the past and it expired or was terminated
 - You should talk with a trusted legal service provider before you renew if you had contact with law enforcement since your last renewal or if your DACA was terminated.  - Unfortunately, those who have never had DACA still cannot apply to the program.

1. Download the [application instructions](#). Read these instructions completely before you begin and have them with you as you complete the application.

2. Be sure to give yourself ample time to complete the entire process. In order to complete the final section, you will need to obtain a letter of recommendation from a department chair, professor, or academic adviser, a valid [enrollment verification](#) or certificate of graduation/copy of degree if you are recent graduate, and an official transcript (or transcripts printed on heat-sensitive security paper) to later be scanned and uploaded to your online application. You do not need to use our enrollment verification form if your institution provides one that includes all the required information from our form. **Please make sure to redact any Personally Identifiable Information (PII) like your social security number (SSN) and date of birth from uploaded documents.**

Note: It typically takes about 2-4 weeks for universities to process requests for official documents like these, so we strongly recommend that you initiate such requests as soon as possible. Please reference the application instructions for details on what constitutes *valid* documentation. If your uploaded documents are invalid or contain personal identifiable information, HNIP staff will remove the documents from your application and ask you to resubmit.

3. Do not use your browser's "Back" button while you are working on your application. Doing so will corrupt the information you've entered and will delay or prevent the processing of your application. You will have an opportunity to make changes to various sections of the application once you've complete all sections.

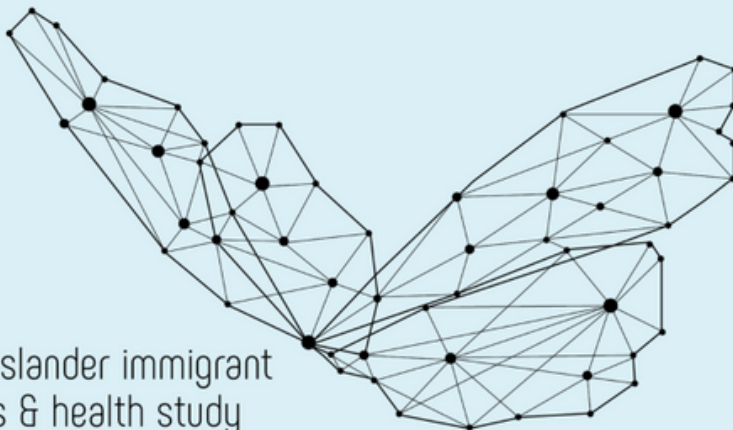
E-Verify Notification

Federal law requires the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) to verify the identity and employment eligibility of all persons hired to work in the United States. HACU will provide the Social Security Administration (SSA) and, if necessary, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), with information from each new employee's Form I-9 to confirm work authorization.
